

Food Idioms

Idioms are expressions that have particular meanings that are often not related to the words that make them up. The expression "make ends meet", which means to spend just as much money as you make, does not give you any clues of its true meaning if you just look at the individual words. In English, there many idioms that use body parts, food, measurements, animals, etc. Are there many idioms in your own language?

The examples below have an idiom related to food. Can you guess the meaning of each of them from the context? Write down what you think they mean.

- I didn't want to take that cooking course, but my husband egged me on saying that I would be great at it.
- The mayor invited only the cream of the crop to his Christmas party.
- That student doesn't listen to his teachers, doesn't do his homework, and bullies his classmates. In a nutshell, he is trouble!

- I am sorry, but I won't go to the game with you. Rugby is really not my cup of tea!
- I know you have a lot on your plate right now, but I really need some help with this project!

- Your cold is small potatoes compared to the terrible pneumonia I had last month.
- My father loves all of his grandchildren, but my little one Lucy is really the apple of his eye.
